3. a) Describe how prophet Elijah fought against corruption and injustices in Israel (8mks)			

- ✓ Naboth a peasant farmer had a fruitful vineyard next to King Ahab's palace
- \checkmark Ahab coveted Naboth's vineyard and offered to buy it at a better price or exchange for another
- \checkmark Naboth refused to sell it or exchange because it was inheritance from his family
- \checkmark Ahab's pagan wife Jezebel influenced him to misuse his powers and get the vineyard
- \checkmark She forged letters in the Kings name and sealed them with his rubber stamp and sent them to elders
- ✓ Naboth was accused falsely of blasphemy and treason which were punishable by stoning to death
- \checkmark Ahab then possessed the land since it was state property
- ✓ Elijah was sent by God to pronounce judgement to Ahab's family
- \checkmark It was prophets work to fight injustice in Israel and the kings were not above the law

b) How did God manifest his power during Prophet Elijah's ministry?

(6mks)

- ✓ God sent fire to burn the sacrifice during the contest at Mt. Carmel with Baal
- \checkmark God brought rain after the drought
- ✓ At Mt. Horeb, God's presence was through a storm, earthquake and lightening
- ✓ God miraculously fed Elijah at the Brook of Cherith at Beersheba/wilderness
- ✓ God brought judgement on King Ahab and his wife Jezebel
- \checkmark Elijah raised the widow's son at Zerapheth through God's power 1x6=6

- \checkmark It promotes injustices on the citizens
- \checkmark It is a criminal offence i.e. one may be imprisoned
- \checkmark It leads to suffering to ones family if one is sacked
- \checkmark It makes the public loose respect and confidence especially if it involves leaders
- ✓ It creates a situation of hopelessness, despair and poverty
- \checkmark It leads to bitterness, hatred if unqualified people are employed 1x6=6

4. a) Outline four categories of true prophets in the Old Testament

- ✓ Major prophets Their messages are long/detailed
- ✓ Minor prophets Their messages/books are short
- ✓ Canonical prophets Are prophets whose messages are recorded in books that bear their names
- Non-canonical prophets Are prophets whose messages have been compiled by other authors
- ✓ Cultic prophets Are prophets whose duties were associated with places of worship
- ✓ Early prophets Are prophets sent by God for specific tasks e.g. Moses 2x4=8

b) Give six similarities between the Traditional African and true prophets in the Old Testament (6mks)

- ✓ Both predicted future events/disasters
- \checkmark Both had supernatural powers to exercise their duties
- ✓ Both were religious leaders who could offer sacrifices and prayers
- ✓ Both urged their people to be morally upright i.e. condemned evils in their society
- ✓ Both led exemplary lives i.e. were role models
- ✓ Both played advisory role to the political leaders i.e. acted as the conscience if the leaders 1x6=6

c) State six challenges which church leaders in Kenya face in their work (6mks)

- ✓ Church leaders are rejected/persecuted/opposition
- ✓ Rivalry among themselves
- ✓ Discrimination on Gender/status/tribalism/nepotism
- ✓ Hypocrisy among church members
- ✓ Inadequate finances
- ✓ Temptations in their duties i.e. social evils bribes
- ✓ Language barrier while spreading the word of God
- \checkmark Conflicting interpretation of the Bible
- \checkmark Political interference in their work
- ✓ Insecurity/Hostility in working environments
- \checkmark Poor infrastructure makes it difficult to reach some areas.
- \checkmark Competition from other religious/cults/false prophets 1x6=6

5. a) Explain four reasons why God was to pass judgement on Israel and other Nations

(8mks)

- ✓ Israel had broken their covenant with God by practicing social injustices
- ✓ Judah had broken their covenant with God by practicing idolatry
- ✓ Syria had committed war crimes by being cruel to the people of Gilead
- ✓ Philistine had sold their fellow citizens into slavery to Edom

(8mks)

- ✓ Tyre had violated the covenant terms of brotherhood with Israelites and exiled them to Edom
- \checkmark Edom had persuaded Israel her brother and its citizens
- ✓ Ammon committed war crimes by being brutal to pregnant women of Gilead 4x2=8

b) Describe the call of Amos to become a prophet of God in Israel

(7mks)

- \checkmark Amos was a shepherd from Tekoa in Judah
- \checkmark He also tendered the Sycamore trees
- ✓ He prophesied during the time of King Jeroboam II of Israel and King Uzziah of Judah
- \checkmark Amos was to prophesy in Israel two years before the earthquake
- ✓ He received God's call with faith and obedience
- ✓ He had deep compulsion to prophesy God's message
- ✓ He received God's message through visions
- ✓ He prophesied God's judgement on Israel because of her sins 7x1=7

c) Outline five ways in which Christians can help curb the evil of oppression of the poor

(5mks)

- \checkmark Christians should show love/compassion to the poor
- \checkmark Avoid extravagant living at the expense of the poor
- \checkmark Should not ignore the poor and needy
- \checkmark Should create employment opportunities for the poor
- \checkmark Should assist in giving bursaries to the children of the poor
- $\checkmark Should practice charity to the poor 1x5=5$

6. a) State five reasons why sacrifices were offered in African traditional society (5mks)

- \checkmark To thank God for various reasons e.g. A good harvest and success in war
- ✓ To avert evil or misfortunes e.g. drought
- ✓ To atone for an offence committed either by an individual or the community i.e. Restore relationship with God and Ancestors
- ✓ It is a way of worshipping God i.e. Fellowship/communion
- ✓ To show respect to the ancestors (or venerate) as they were intermediaries between the living and God 1x5=5

b) **Outline the role of kinship system in traditional African communities** (7mks)

- ✓ Kingship system gives an individual a deep sense of belonging
- \checkmark It provides security to the members
- ✓ It unites the members/binds together
- \checkmark It helps to maintain law and order
- \checkmark It regulates marital customs and rules
- \checkmark It dictates division of labour among members
- \checkmark It governs relationship between the living and the dead
- \checkmark It helps to settle disputes hence promote peace and harmony
- \checkmark It encourages members to help one another and support widows, orphans and the aged.

- c) Explain four ways in which western education has affected kinship ties in the society today (8mks)
 - Individualism by the educated members who are less concerned about poor kinship members
 - \checkmark Children from educated families do not name their children names of their ancestors
- ✓ Educated parents fear to leave their children with unhygienic grandparents
- ✓ Education abroad separate kin members
- ✓ Educated work in urban areas with limited space for extended families
- ✓ Western education allow interracial marriages
- ✓ Educated members settle disputes in courts and not through elders
- ✓ Educated members are involved in careers and take orphans to orphan homes
